

YER 2 EMPIRE PROJECT!

As part of our learning about Castles and Kings/Queens this term we were due to look in more detail at Queen Victoria, and in particular the growth of the British Empire and the links made to many different countries around the world. Therefore this week we have decided to opt for the theme of Empire with a focus on INDIA for all learning this week.



This project is completely flexible and you can choose to do as little or much of it as you like. Do what works for you and your children. These activities are some we have put together as they are age appropriate and link to some areas of the curriculum. However if you would like to devise you own activities then please feel free to do so. Some of these activities link together but many are stand alone which, from your feedback, was preferred.

<u>Spellings:</u> See the topical word mat which has a wide range or words of differing levels. Choose 5 - 10 words to practise through the week and see if you can get them correct in any of the writing activities you choose.

Writing and reading tasks this week will be incorporated with the project elements (see the table below) We know that the reading is quite high level and may be difficult for some children to access. If you find this then please just read books from home or ebooks from Oxford Owl and focus more on the activities that do not require reading. For children who may be working more independently or don't have as much adult support, completing some of these project tasks may be tricky, particularly the writing ones which usually require more support. If this is the case, just opt out of these activities.

Maths will largely be stand alone worksheets / activities and are detailed at the bottom of the table.

Should your children prefer more structured and directed tasks there is always many activities on the BBC Bitesize Daily Lessons website. We have purposely left these for you to explore yourself should you prefer a different activity or style of learning.

PE and games	Cricket is hugely popular in India; it is pretty much the national game. Children in India like to play even if they don't have the proper equipment! Perhaps you could have a go at setting up a mini cricket game in your garden using anything you can find or make up your own bat and ball style game. Remember you can use anything for "equipment" a rolled up pair of socks as a ball, a folded up piece of carboard box for a bat. (making / sourcing this equipment may be as fun as actually playing a game!)	Snakes and ladders was invented in India. It was a game to show children about Karma, the idea that if you do good things in life you get to go up the ladder towards God and that if you did bad things in life you might come back in another life as an animal like the snake which was not popular! Maths	Suggested Maths activities This week we are looking at statistics. This is the collection and presentation of data e.g. tally charts and graphs. For each of the days from Monday to Wednesday there will be a separate activity plan and resources posted each day.		
	Monday: Looking at tally charts		
	Tuesday: Introduction to pictograms		
	Wednesday: Problem solving and reasoning about pictograms.		
	Detailed explanations and examples are included within the daily lessons which will be posted each day to make them easier to locate. You can complete the suggested questions on paper or just through discussion as works best for you.		
	Thursday: Using what you have learnt think of a survey you could carry out easily at home e.g. People's favourite colour (a good opportunity to call or message friends or family to ask them!) or how many of each colour toy car you have? Favourite sports or food? You can do anything you like! Limit the number of choices to 5 (e.g. five different foods or colours people can choose from). On Thursday just complete a tally chart as shown Monday!		
	Friday: Using your results from Thursday create a pictogram! Be creative! Either draw a pictogram		

where 1 picture = 1 persons choice or object, or even create a pictogram practically using objects
